

# VIDEO- TÜRSPRECHSYSTEM VT200

## BEDIENUNGSANLEITUNG

## APP-ANLEITUNG ▶ ab S. 6 (nur in Verbindung mit VT200IPG)

Diese Anleitung ist für den Benutzer (Bewohner).

Das Türsprechsystem bietet folgende Grundfunktionen:

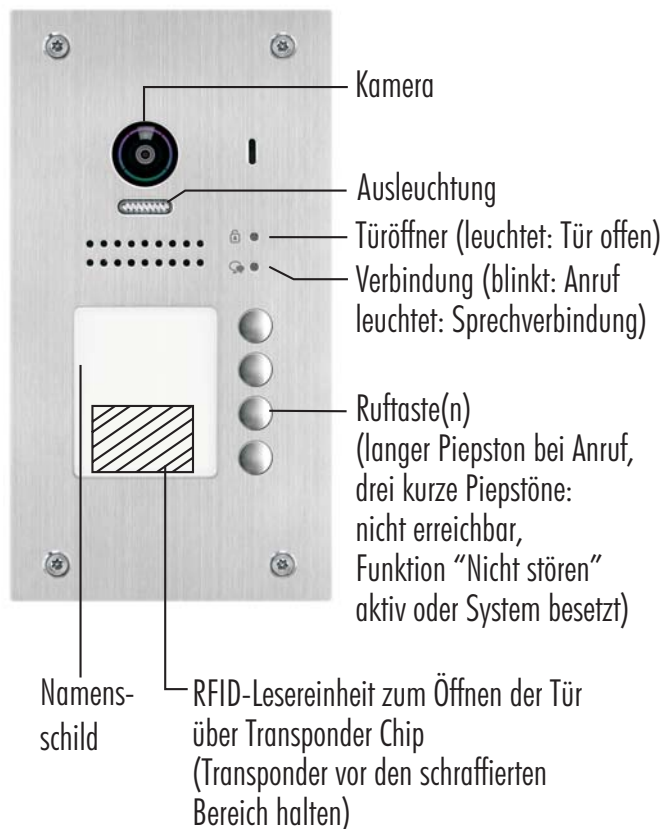
- Gespräch mit Besucher
- Livebild von Besucher während Gespräch / Livebild manuell öffnen
- Türöffner ansteuern (falls vorhanden)
- Nicht-stören-Funktion

Je nach Ausstattung:

- Interne Anrufe
- Rufweiterleitung auf Smartphone-App; App kostenlos erhältlich für iOS und Android (durch Google lizenzierte Version)
- Speicherfunktion verpasster Anrufe
- Kamerabild von Zusatzkameras

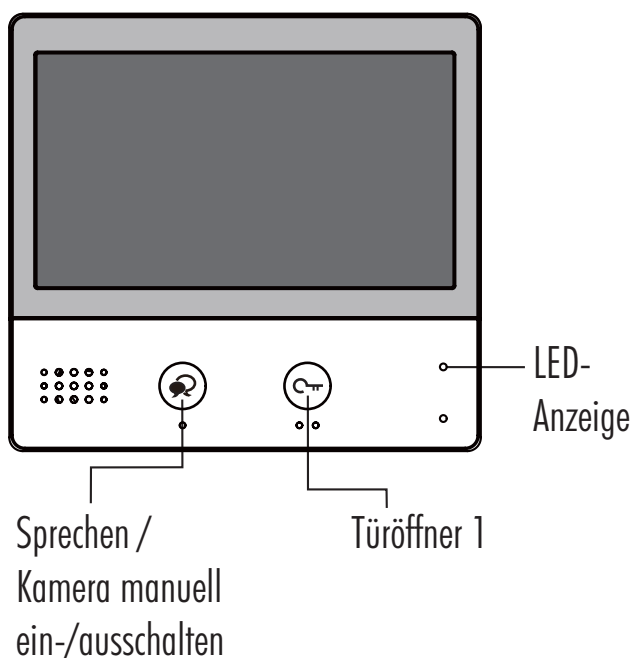
Sie haben die Möglichkeit, einen Klingelton und die Lautstärke für einen Anruf festzulegen.

## 2. Gespräch an der Innenstation annehmen



Sobald jemand an der Türsprechstelle die Rufaste betätigt, ertönt ein Klingelton und auf dem Display der Haupt-Innenstation erscheint das Bild der Türsprechstellenkamera. Sind weitere Innenstationen in der Wohnung, kann an diesen "Neben-Innenstationen" das Bild durch Tippen auf das Display angezeigt werden.

Sie können das Gespräch mit der Taste "Sprechen" annehmen oder gleich mit der Taste "Türöffner 1" die Tür öffnen. Wird das Gespräch angenommen, so werden sämtliche weiteren Innenstationen im System blockiert.

Aus Sicherheitsgründen kann der Türöffner nur bei aktiver Kamera aktiviert werden. Wenn mehr als eine Türsprechstelle vorhanden ist, wird der Türöffner derjenigen Türsprechstelle angesteuert, deren Kamerabild angezeigt wird. Wird das Gespräch angenommen, wird es automatisch nach 90 Sekunden beendet. Wird das Gespräch nicht angenommen, erlischt das Kamerabild automatisch nach 40 Sekunden.

## LED-Anzeige

LED leuchtet	Betriebsbereit
LED blinkt schnell	Es wird angerufen
LED blinkt langsam	Bild wurde aufgenommen (nach der letzten Rufannahme)
LED leuchtet unterbrochen	"Nicht stören" Funktion aktiv

## Hinweistöne

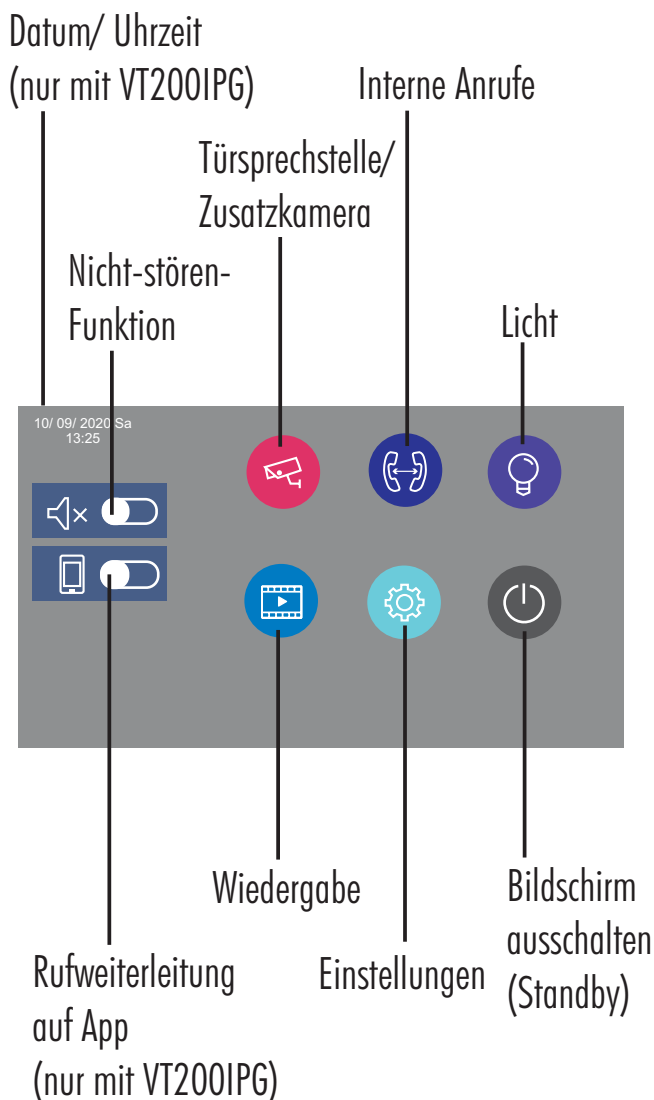
Drei kurze Piepstöne: Funktion nicht vorhanden oder System blockiert

Rechts werden Icons für weitere Optionen eingeblendet. Diese verschwinden nach ein paar Sekunden, erscheinen aber wieder durch Tippen auf das Display.



### 3. Bedienung über Hauptmenü

Tippen Sie an einer beliebigen Stelle auf das Display, um in das Hauptmenü zu gelangen.



#### Manuelles Einschalten von Türsprechstellen/Kameras

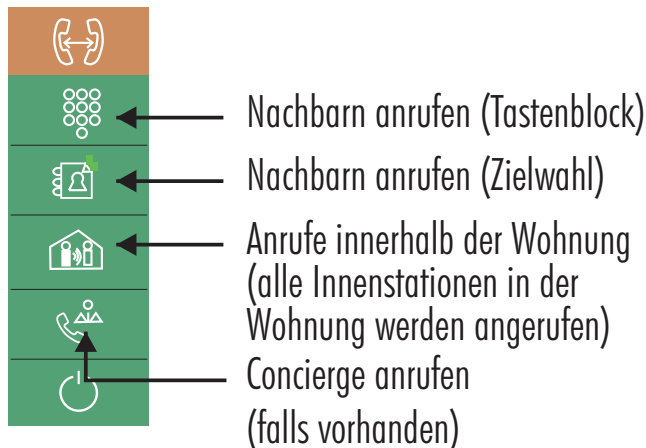
Wenn nur eine Türsprechstelle eingebunden ist, erscheint sofort das Bild der Kamera.

Bei mehreren Türsprechstellen bzw. Kameras wählen Sie die gewünschte aus.

Bei Aktivierung einer Türsprechstellenkamera kann danach das Gespräch aufgebaut oder die Tür geöffnet werden.

#### Interne Anrufe

Hier können verschiedene Internteilnehmer angerufen werden.



#### Licht

Licht einschalten über Relaismodul VT200R (falls im System als Lichtrelais programmiert). Die Einschaltdauer wird im Relaismodul eingestellt.

#### Wiedergabe

Diese Funktion ist nur verfügbar, wenn ein optionales VT200IPG vorhanden ist.

Ist im IP-Gateway eine microSD-Karte eingesetzt, werden 10-sekündige Videosequenzen gespeichert, ansonsten werden nur Bilder gespeichert.

Aufnahmen erfolgen ca. 7 Sekunden nach Betätigen der zur Wohnung dazugehörigen Ruftaste an der Türsprechstelle.

#### Nicht stören


Hier kann eingestellt werden, dass die Innenstation nicht mehr angerufen werden kann.

Zum Ein- und Ausschalten drücken Sie auf den Schieber. Befindet sich dieser links und ist grau hinterlegt, kann die Innenstation wieder angerufen werden. Wird er nach rechts geschoben und ist grün hinterlegt, werden Gespräche so lange blockiert, wie der Schieber nach rechts gestellt ist. Das Blockieren wird durch ein kurz unterbrochenes Blinken der LEDs angezeigt. "Nicht stören" bezieht sich auf Tür-, Nachbar- und Wohnungsruf, jedoch nicht auf Etagenruf.

## Rufweiterleitung auf App

(nur möglich mit Internetverbindung über ein VT200IPG, sowie nach Einrichtung der App):

Beim Klingeln an der Tür, wird der Anruf an die auf einem Smartphone installierte App weitergeleitet.

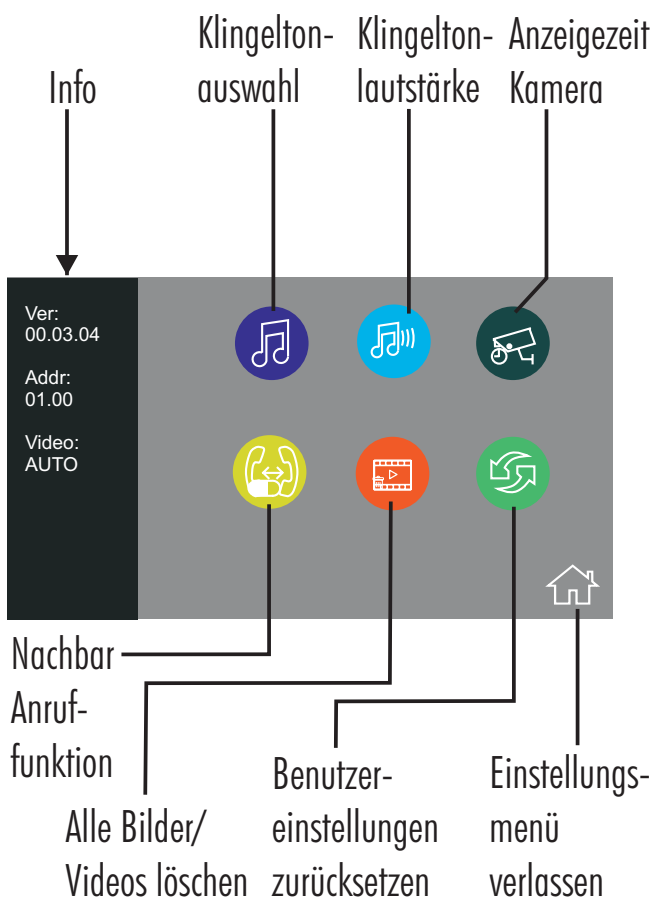
Tippen Sie auf den Schieber, um die Weiterleitung ein- und auszuschalten (grün = ein). Wenn die Weiterleitung ausgewählt ist, aber keine Internetverbindung besteht, so wird dies durch das Symbol  unten links angezeigt.

Wichtig: Nicht stören darf nicht aktiviert sein.

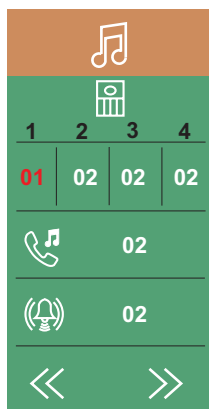
## 4. Benutzereinstellungen

Durch Tippen auf eine beliebige Stelle des Displays, wird der Standby Modus beendet.

Tippen Sie auf , um in den Einstellungsmodus zu gelangen.

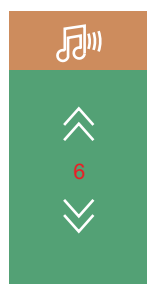

- Die Klingelton-Lautstärke wird in einem separaten Menüpunkt eingestellt.
- Die Klingeltondauer ist abhängig vom ausgewählten Klingelton und nicht änderbar

## Klingelton-Lautstärke einstellen

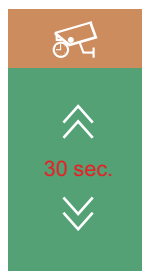


← lauter

← leiser (0 = stumm)

Mit den Pfeiltasten nach oben und nach unten kann die Lautstärke für alle Ruftöne pauschal zwischen 0 und 9 eingestellt werden.

## Anzeigezeit Kamera



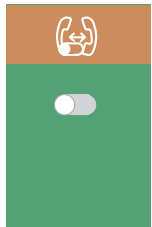
← länger

← kürzer

Die Anzeigezeit für manuelles Einschalten der Türsprechstellenkameras bzw. der Zusatzkameras ist zwischen 6 Sekunden und 10 Minuten. Werkseinstellung: 30 Sekunden.

Hinweis: Bei automatischer Aktivierung der Kamera durch Ruffastendruck ist die Anzeigedauer auf 40 Sekunden festgelegt.

## Nachbar Anruffunktion aktivieren/deaktivieren




← auf den Schieber tippen:  
rechts/grün: aktiv  
links/weiß: nicht aktiv

Ist die Funktion aktiviert, können Sie sowohl vom Nachbarn erreicht werden als auch den Nachbarn anrufen (gilt nicht für interne Anrufe innerhalb der Wohnung).

Tippen Sie auf , um alle Bilder und Videos zu löschen, die von der Türsprechstellenkamera aufgenommen und dieser Ruffaste zugeordnet sind.

## Benutzereinstellung zurücksetzen

Tippen Sie auf , um alle Einstellungen (Klingelton, Klingelton-Lautstärke, Anzeigzeit, Kamera, Nachbar-Anruffunktion) wieder auf Werkseinstellungen zurückzusetzen.

## Datum und Uhrzeit

Das Datum und die Uhrzeit werden nur dann auf dem Display angezeigt, wenn im System ein VT200IPG-Modul installiert ist.

Bitte stellen Sie das Datum und die Uhrzeit immer an der Haupt-Innenstation ein und nicht an einer Neben-Innenstation. Die Anzeige ändert sich dann an den Neben-Innenstationen entsprechend.

Im Falle eines Stromausfalls müssen Sie ggf. Datum und Uhrzeit neu einstellen.

In der linken oberen Ecke des Bildschirms wird dann das Datum und die Uhrzeit angezeigt. Um hier Änderungen vorzunehmen, drücken Sie auf die Datums- und Uhrzeitsanzeige.

## 5. Sonderfunktionen (falls vorhanden)

### Hörer

Durch Abnehmen/Auflegen des Hörers kann das Gespräch gestartet/beendet werden.

### Türöffnen nach Klingeln (Arztschaltung)

Ist diese Funktion eingestellt, so wird der Türöffner nach Drücken der Ruffaste an der Türsprechanlage automatisch angesteuert.

## 6. App-Einrichtung

Diese Funktion ist nur möglich, wenn ein VT200IPG-Modul im System vorhanden und mit dem Internet verbunden ist.

Wenn Sie mehrere Innenstationen in der Wohnung betreiben, so erfolgt die App-Einrichtung an der Haupt-Innenstation.

Bis zu drei Endgeräte können an der Innenstation registriert werden.

In der App kann nur eine Innenstation angemeldet werden.

**Die App ist kein Bestandteil dieses Produktes, es besteht keine Zusage eines Servicelevels.**

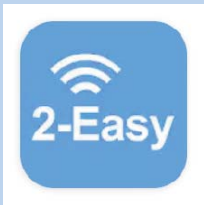

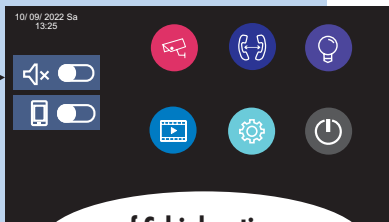

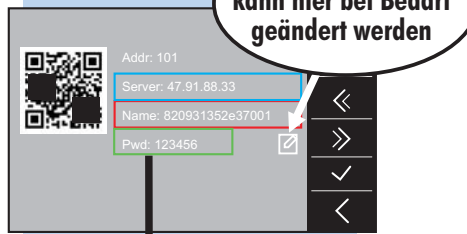

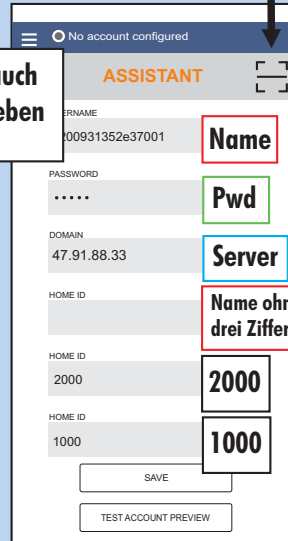

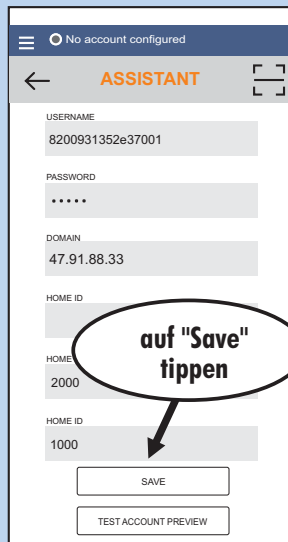
Damit das Telefon klingelt, müssen Benachrichtigungen für die App am Telefon erlaubt sein.

  - ab Android 8 muss die Akku-Optimierung ausgeschaltet werden

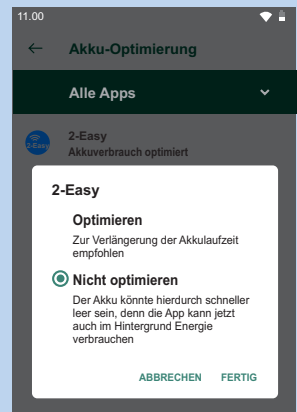
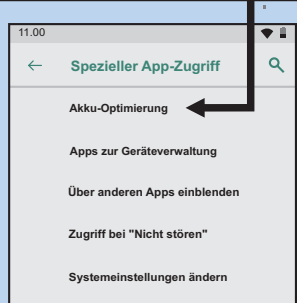

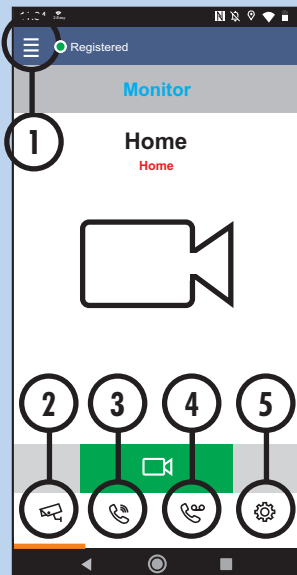

Auf Schieber neben Smartphone-Symbol tippen, sodass der Schieber rechts steht und sich grün verfärbt

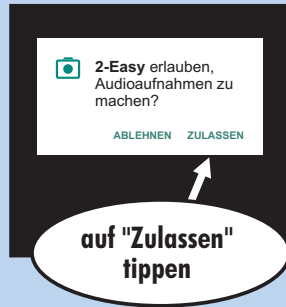
- Weiterleitung ist so lange aktiviert, wie Schieber rechts steht

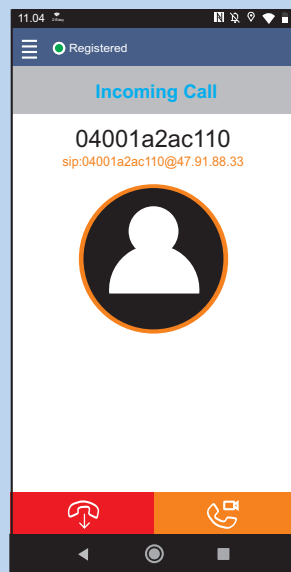

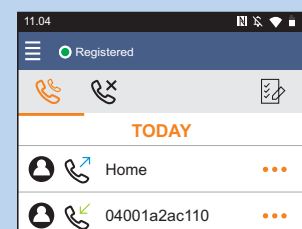
